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FOR RELEASE: July 25, 2012

With federal elections dominating New Jersey politics this year, county party committees reported a modest amount of campaign finance activity during the first six months of 2012, jointly raising and spending about \$2.1 million during that period, according to quarterly reports filed with the New Jersey Election Law Enforcement Commission (ELEC).

Democratic committees reported raising and spending more and reported a larger combined cash reserve. However, when cash-on-hand is adjusted for debts owed to or by committees, Republicans reported a higher net worth.

While fundraising and spending both were slightly higher than during the previous quarter, both were down compared to the same period four years ago for both parties.

One caveat- second quarter reports had not been filed as of 5 p.m. July 24 for Cumberland, Monmouth, Salem or Warren Democratic committees, or the Hudson, Middlesex and Union Republican committees. However, those committees generally do not report large totals.

"County committees so far have raised about \$500,000 less than they did last year through the first half of the year," said Jeff Brindle, ELEC's Executive Director. "They raised more money last year due to it being a legislative election year."

"This year, there could be less pressure to raise money because most of the focus will be federal elections," he said.

Brindle previously has pointed out that several factors have caused party fundraising totals to decline in recent years. Those factors include the nation's economic downturn, pay-to-play restrictions that have curtailed contributions by public contractors to party committees, and increased fundraising by committees that spend independently of the parties.

During the first six months of 2012, the Passaic County Democratic Committee raised the most money among Democratic committees, spent the most and reported the largest cash reserve. Five Democratic committees reported a negative net worth-Burlington, Gloucester, Hudson, Monmouth, and Union.

The Somerset County Republican Committee reported the most cash-on-hand as of June 30. One county committee- Hunterdon- reported a negative net worth.
